## Gerren Glenn Price, acting president and CEO, DowntownDC Business Improvement District

Gerren Price, a board member for Arts for Learning and Sisters Circle, among others, had been working in the nonprofit and local government sector for more than a decade when he joined the District's largest BID, at 138 blocks, 520 properties and \$15.6 million in revenue last year. He took over as acting president when Neil Albert stepped down in March and, during the pandemic alone, had stood up a food services operation that provided 250 meals daily to the unhoused, led the distribution of personal protective equipment to 1,500 businesses and patio heaters to 181 restaurants, and won a \$1 million D.C. grant to reactivate downtown streets in a more pedestrian-friendly way.

I. How would you describe your work to someone you met at a cocktail party?

I am in the business of economic development. I lead a team in planning, creating and maintaining clean, safe and welcoming public spaces for all who work, live, visit, gather and celebrate in downtown Washington, D.C. This includes doing the necessary, but not-so-pretty, work of servicing nearly 3,000 trash/recycling cans each day, ensuring our streets are free of litter, removing graffiti, clearing snow from walkways and bike lanes and fixing defects. It also involves stage setting work to ensure all community voices are a part of critical planning efforts and holding safe spaces for people to share and debate opinions. It also involves lots of behind-the-scenes work to track and report on economic data, market and promote our local businesses and cultural institutions and curating events, activations, and public art to amplify the vibrancy and beauty of our community.

- 2. Most pivotal moment in your career so far: Stepping into my current role as president and CEO. Like many American downtowns, D.C. was hit hard by the pandemic. Though we face many challenges on the road to full recovery, there are signs of forward progress, but also so many opportunities to reimagine what is possible in downtown. I feel incredibly fortunate to be in this role at this critical time.
- Morning person or night owl? I find myself having to be both at times! However, I do my best work as a night owl.

The most pressing issue you think your generation is facing: My generation has faced a myriad of pressing issues throughout our lifetimes, but I think the two that are most pressing today are climate change and poverty. We need immediate action and bold policy to ensure that our environment is protected and preserved for the next generation. We also need to address the affordable housing crisis and reenvision public education to ensure that more people have access to opportunities to participate fully in society.
